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the poems in raised by humans are about surviving childhood and colonization childhood did not agree with deborah miranda mostly because the adult humans in charge of her life were not prepared to manage their own lives let alone the life of a human in training humans raised

deborah but it wasn't a humane childhood this poetry collection is also about how indigenous people survive civilization and become readers and writers of the same alphabet that colonized their culture the complexity of being forced to find her way into relationship with the very people or cultures that have hurt raised miranda is a paradox at the heart of her poetry which pushes language past what miranda calls the alphabet of walls

newly expanded a memoir hailed as essential by the likes of leslie marmon silko and elle magazine bad indians part tribal history part lyric and intimate memoir is essential reading for anyone seeking to learn about california indian history past and present widely adopted in classrooms and book clubs throughout the united states bad indians now reissued in significantly expanded form for its 10th anniversary plumbs ancestry survivance and the cultural memory of native california in this best selling now classic memoir deborah a miranda tells stories of her ohlone costanoan esselen family and the experiences of california indians more widely through oral histories newspaper clippings anthropological recordings personal reflections and poems this anniversary edition the first time the book has seen release in hardcover format includes new poems and essays as well as an extensive afterword wise indignant and playful all at once bad indians is a beautiful and devastating read and an indispensable book for anyone seeking a more just telling of american history

this book leads readers through a troubled past using the authors family circle as a touch point and resource for discovery of much more personal and strong these stories present an evocative new view of the shaping of california and the role of the mission period in the lives of all california indians the result is a work of literary art that is wise angry and playful all at once

these poems explore interlocking themes of sacrifice willing and forced and the sacred dimension of nature and the need for spiritual healing in a world suffering from the aftereffects of slavery and genocide as well as homophobia and environmental damage many of the poems describe subjects in the virginia appalachian region as well as the author's indigenous ohlone costanoan esselen california coastal homeland

poetry native american studies winner of the north american native authors first book award deborah miranda's indian cartography provides a psychic and emotional remapping of the native american world of the west coast in lyric verse that is sometimes spare sometimes dramatic miranda charts a homeward journey through the heart's territory a land that has long been torn disrupted and colonized in the harshest sense of that word janice gould the first poem grabbed my wrist and held me for the duration the prose is equally alive and its images have the precision

and the edge of the finest poetry seamless back and forth journey from one little girl to another one woman to another one memory to another all distinct yet connected one long scream from a heart who will not stop living whose life is an affirmation of survival wendy rose miranda's poetry and essays have appeared in bricolage calyx calloo the cimarron review raven chronicles and soujourner

the zen of la llorona is a second collection of poetry by a native american woman and as such it goes beyond initial concerns with personal racial identity while still very much speaking from an indigenous point of view the zen of la llorona complicates that indigenous identity with visceral explorations of gendered violence sexual orientation and mothering in an unpredictable chaotic world key to these poems are historical and current events traumas as distant as the colonization of california's indigenous peoples and as close as the destructive forces of 9 11 and the wars in iraq and afghanistan how do we survive destruction without becoming destroyers ourselves how can the elements of earth love community and work nurture creation and manifest hope utilizing the figure of la llorona a mythical indigenous figure of the americas who first murders and then mourns her children the poems in this book seek to unravel the mysterious fascination we have with despair and move us along with the poet to a more clarifying centering focus on joy zen the author notes tells us everyone loses everything leaving us with only a decision about our attitude toward loss itself la llorona on the other hand says nonsense there's always something left to lose what that something is and how we can preserve and honor it is at the heart of this collection of poems

unpapered is a collection of personal narratives by indigenous writers exploring the meaning and limits of native american identity beyond its legal margins native heritage is neither simple nor always clearly documented and citizenship is a legal and political matter of sovereign nations determined by such criteria as blood quantum tribal rolls or community involvement those who claim a native cultural identity often have family stories of tenuous ties dating back several generations given that tribal enrollment was part of a string of government programs and agreements calculated to quantify and dismiss native populations many writers who identify culturally and are recognized as native americans do not hold tribal citizenship with essays by trevino brings plenty deborah miranda steve russell and kimberly wieser among others unpapered charts how current exclusionary tactics began as a response to pretendians non indigenous people assuming a native identity for job benefits and have expanded to an intense patrolling of identity that divides native communities and has resulted in attacks on peoples professional spiritual emotional and physical states an essential addition to native discourse unpapered shows how social and political ideologies have created barriers for native people truthfully claiming identities while simultaneously upholding stereotypes

this handbook brings together philosophical work on how language shapes and is shaped by social and political factors its 24 chapters were written exclusively for this volume by an international team of leading researchers and together they provide a broad expert introduction to the major issues currently under discussion in this area the volume is divided into four parts part i methodological and foundational issues part ii non ideal semantics and pragmatics part iii linguistic harms part iv applications the parts and chapters in each part are introduced in the volume s general introduction a list of works cited concludes each chapter pointing readers to further areas of study the handbook is the first major multi authored reference work in this growing area and essential reading for anyone interested in the nature of language and its relationship to social and political reality

in this edited collection gioia woods and her contributors bring together histories biographies close readings and theories about the literary and cultural left in the american west as it is distinct from the more often theorized literary left in major eastern metropolitan centers left in

the west expands our understanding of what constitutes the literary left in the u s by including writers artists and movements not typically considered within the traditional context of the literary left in doing so it provides a new understanding of the region s place among global and political ideologies from the early 19th century to the present a remarkably complex and varied body of literary and cultural production has emerged out of progressive social movements while the literary left in the west shared many interests with other regional expressions labor class anti fascism and anti imperialism the influence of manifest destiny the distinct history of settler colonialism in western territories caused western leftists to develop concerns unique to the region chapters in the volume provide an impressive range of analysis covering artists and movements from suffragist writers to bohemian californian photographers from civil rights activists to popular folk musicians from latinx memoirists to native american experimental writers to name just a few the unique consideration of the west as a socio political region establishes a framework for political critique that moves beyond class consequences anti fascism and civil liberties and into distinct western concerns such as native american sovereignty environmental exploitation and the legacies of settler colonialism what emerges is a deeper understanding of the region and its unique people places and concerns
