how history works assesses the social function of academic knowledge in the humanities exemplified by history and offers a critique of the validity of historical knowledge the book focusses on history's academic disciplinary ethos to offer a reconception of the discipline of history arguing that it is an existential liability if critical analysis reveals the sense that history offers to the world to be illusory what stops historical scholarship from becoming a disguise for pessimism or nihilism history is routinely invoked in all kinds of cultural political economic psychological situations to provide a reliable account or justification of what is happening moreover it addresses a world already receptive to comprehensive historical explanations since everyone has some knowledge of history everyone can be manipulated by it this book analyses the relationship between specialized knowledge and everyday experience taking phenomenology husserl and pragmatism james as methodological guides it is informed by a wide literature sceptical of the sense academic historical expertise produces and of the work history does represented by thinkers such as schopenhauer nietzsche valéry anders and cioran how history works discusses how history makes sense of the world even if what happens is senseless arguing that behind the smoke screen of historical scholarship looms a chaotic world dynamic indifferent to human existence it

is valuable reading for anyone interested in historiography and historical theory

ruth klüger 1931 2020 passed away on october 5 2020 in the u s born in vienna and deported to theresienstadt she survived auschwitz and the shoah together with her mother after living in germany for a short time after the war she immigrated to new york she was educated in the u s and received degrees in english literature as well as her ph d in german literature at the university of california berkeley she taught at several american universities she has numerous scholarly publications to her credit mostly in the fields of german and austrian literary history she is also recognized as a poet in her own right an essayist and a feminist critic she returned to europe where she was a guest professor in göttingen and vienna her memoir entitled weiter leben 1992 which she translated and revised in an english parallel text as still alive was a major bestseller and highly regarded autobiographical account of a holocaust survivor it was subsequently translated into more than a dozen languages it has also generated a vigorous critical discussion in its own right ruth klüger received numerous prestigious literary prizes and other distinctions the present volume the legacy of ruth klüger and the end of the auschwitz century aims to honor her memory by assessing critically her writings and career taking her biography and writings as points of departure the volume includes contributions in fields and from perspectives which her writings helped to bring into focus acutely in the table of contents are listed the following contributions sander l gilman poetry and naming in ruth klüger s works and life heinrich detering spannung

fackenheim was one of the most philosophically serious knowledgeable and provocative contemporary jewish thinkers his original focus as a philosophical theologian was mainly on revelation but in his later work he concerned himself primarily with the wide ranging implications of the holocaust in this book kenneth hart green examines fackenheim s intellectual trajectory and traces how and why he focused so intently on the holocaust he explores the deeper thought that fackenheim developed about the holocaust which he construed as a cataclysmic event that ruptured history and one that also brought about a change in the very structure of being as green demonstrates the holocaust according to fackenheim s interpretation changes how we view all things from god to man to history it also radically affects judaism christianity and philosophy the major traditions that have shaped the western world

this collection of essays is selected from presentations at the second international conference on philosophical theology the university of st andrews st andrews scotland august 1993 the conference sponsored by the highlands institute for american religious thought highlands north carolina includes scholars from the united states and other countries the highlands institute emphasizes the interface between theology and philosophy with attention to theological efforts utilizing the american philosophical tradition the history and development of religious thought in america themes relevant to the chicago school of theology and naturalism in american religious thought the st andrews conference focused on relations between religious thought and ecology but other religious and philosophical topics were also addressed
